The little mouse went up the stairs and nestled in his bed.


Soon a vision came to him, as dreams filled up his head.



Winter Holidays Around the World

Look for these banners on your downtown adventure to learn about the holidays they represent!



The symbol on this banner, **As-salamu alaykum**, is a year-round greeting in Arabic that means, "May peace be upon you." The design is inspired by elements in Turkish architecture.



Chinese or Lunar New Year is the festival that celebrates the beginning of a new year based on the traditional Chinese calendar. Celebrations often include lighting lanterns, giving gifts and watching fireworks. Lanterns are featured on the banner, along with clouds that signify good luck. The Chinese character Fú means "fortune." Chinese New Year is on January 22, 2023.



Christmas is celebrated as a major Christian holiday in many countries around the world. In the United States, popular celebrations include decorating a Christmas tree, caroling and giving gifts. Saint Nicholas, or Santa Claus, is said to bring good children a gift during the night before Christmas. Christmas Day is on December 25.



Hanukkah is the Jewish eight-day "festival of lights," celebrated with a nightly menorah lighting and games including dreidel, as pictured on the banner. "L'chaim" is a celebratory expression in Hebrew that means "to life." Hanukkah 2022 begins on the evening of December 18 and ends on the evening of December 26.



Kwanzaa is a week-long celebration to honor African heritage, culminating in gift-giving and a feast. There are 7 principles of Kwanzaa: *Umoja* (Unity), *Kujichaglia* (Self-Determination), *Ujima* (Collective Work and Responsibility), *Ujamaa* (Cooperative Economics), *Nia* (Purpose), *Kuumba* (Creativity) and *Imani* (Faith). Kwanzaa begins on December 26, 2022 and ends on January 1, 2023.



In the United States, **New Year** traditions include fireworks, counting down to the stroke of midnight, making New Year's resolutions and singing "Auld Lang Syne." New Year's Eve is December 31 and New Year's Day is January 1.



In Latin American cultures, **Noche Buena** (Christmas Eve) is often a bigger celebration than Christmas Day. Families gather together to share a special meal and celebrate with music and dancing. Poinsettias are a popular symbol and are called *flor de Noche Buena*. Noche Buena is December 24.



On the last day of the year, the Japanese tradition of **Omisoka** is observed, where people often complete activities for the concluding year, such as house cleaning and repaying debts. The *kadomatsu* featured on this banner are traditional Japanese decorations placed in pairs in front of homes to welcome ancestral spirits, or *kami*, of the harvest. The characters coupled with the *kadomatsu* imagery deliver a message of "Happy New Year."

Colored Ice Sculptures

They are easy to make and a creative building activity.



You'll need

cups, muffin tins, containers, and bowls of various sizes and shapes

water

food coloring or liquid watercolors

Directions

Dye water using food coloring or liquid watercolors. Pour the water into various containers and freeze.

Once frozen, run the containers under warm water to loosen and remove the ice.

You can use the ice shapes in a sensory play bin or take them outside and create unexpected winter sculptures.


